## Committee of Management Report

As the crunch and rustle of leaves around our ankles alerts us to the last throes of summer, it's pleasing to be able to report that your U3A has settled into the year's activities seamlessly. But that's not without significant efforts behind the scenes.

I'm still very new to U3A, but I'm quickly learning that many of you have already devoted many hours in, often, a number of roles over more years than perhaps you care to remember, and, on behalf of your fellow members, I thank you for that service and for playing a part in creating the vibrant organisation we have today.

And I should note that Monique Thomson, having passed on the Secretary's baton, will continue on the Committee of Management and has taken on the role of Volunteer Coordinator.

Talking of volunteers, I don't need to remind you again, but I'm going to anyway, that without volunteers, the activities that I see and hear people enjoying so heartily simply would not exist.

We now have 99 activities or classes - call them what you will - available. Your tutors will devote nearly three thousand hours of class time alone over this year, and who knows how many hours of preparation. And all this activity is overseen, polished and buffed by our dedicated Course Coordination Working Group, led by Russell Annear.

And all of that activity would count for nought without the calm efficiency of Venues Coordinator Elizabeth Brown. She juggles available venues and class requirements with the dexterity of a Cirque du Soleil performer to get the best matches we can.

It's unfair to highlight individuals because there are always others helping behind the scenes to enable them to achieve what they do.

And such is the case with our Finance team. My Committee of Management colleague, John Waldie, mentioned in last month's newsletter that we are seeking a volunteer to take on the role of Treasurer, as Jo Thompson winds down her involvement. So I wanted to take this opportunity to focus on that role and the supports we have in place to assist.

Jo doesn't do it all herself - she heads a **team**. There's a paid bookkeeper handling all of the posting to ledgers in MYOB, and advising the Treasurer. There's an Accounts Payable volunteer paying our bills. There's an Assistant Treasurer managing membership fees, event monies and class levies, and liaising with our office volunteers on finance matters. Our accounts are managed in MYOB, so no-one is sweating over dusty ledgers in a darkened cell. And then there's the Finance Working Group

supporting the Treasurer and advising the Committee of Management. The Treasurer is also a member of the Executive of the Committee of Management.

*Have you dealt with finance in some capacity before, either in a club or professionally? **You don't need to be an accountant.** Have you used MYOB? **Have you used spreadsheets (Excel) in some capacity?** Do you have a few hours you could devote to managing the Finance team?*

If you need a short refresher course to get back up to speed after a break, perhaps that can be arranged. If you're hesitant about taking the task on, talk to Jo Thompson or someone on the Committee and we can try to find a way to make it work for you.

Our newsletter and website teams are after photographs of people "doing things" at U3A classes and events. Sitting playing bridge, scrabble or chess is just as much "doing things" as playing pétanque or table tennis! Every smartphone has a camera, **so let's get to it**. 

## In Remembrance...

### Nick Hudson

... village treasure and Town Crier of Newstead, died on 1 March, 2018. He would have been 85 in April. He ran a stimulating U3A course 'Modern Australian Usage', an abiding



interest of his. Indeed he wrote a book, still in print, with exactly that title, an Australian rival to the classic Fowler's Modern English Usage, but easier to understand and wittier.

Nick was a Words man. He earned his living as a publisher, first at Heinemann Education Australia, a business which he developed from scratch and later with his own company Hudson Publishing. Among the more notable of the publications for which he was responsible was Peter Wright's Spycatcher, which, thanks to Maggie Thatcher's attempt to have the book banned and a brilliant defence by young Malcolm Turnbull, went on to sell two million copies.

Nick wrote many books himself. He was, for instance, the principal editor of the Heinemann Australian Dictionary (1976), the first dictionary designed specifically for Australian schools. Another of his more popular

books was 'The Vedgymight History of Australia' described in the blurb as containing 'Concentrated History Extract'. It is the Australian equivalent of the English classic '1066 and All That'. When he died Nick was working on a book on English grammar, a subject on which he had firm and original views.

Nick had a degree in Greats (Latin, Classical Greek, Ancient History and Philosophy) from Oxford. He was an enthusiastic joiner and contributor to intellectual groups and clubs such as the Samuel Johnson Society. Many U3A members will remember his contributions to the 'Words in Winter' festivals. His contributions to debates were invariably original, intelligent, and witty. He will be greatly missed. David Cunningham

Hugh had been a U3A member since arriving in Castlemaine in 2009. Early on he took a course for us, "Collections", enjoyed by many and held in the front room of our Art Gallery.




Last year Hugh presented us with a short course, "Versailles". Paris and French history were great passions of his. Hugh spoke French well and had planned a group tour there in May this year.

Hugh was a great supporter of U3A, always first to help with catering events, so many of us enjoyed his anchovy pastries and his charming, friendly and professional waiting service. He attended many courses over time so there will be a lot of members and course leaders who knew him well.

Many others will know Hugh as an antiques dealer, he had a number of 'pop up shops' in Castlemaine over the years, selling rugs about which he had a great deal of knowledge and sometimes furniture and objects, all either with a story or of a slightly quirky nature. A flamboyant and generous man, he was a great cook and enjoyed having friends at his table, always set with care and without fail some wonderful china and glassware. Hugh made many friends in Castlemaine.

There is a house in Castlemaine renovated by

Hugh where he expressed his passion for gardening to great effect. It will forever be a pleasure for Jo and wonderful memorial to Hugh. A creative, animated, affectionate man, Hugh will be missed by many in Castlemaine.

**Alert: Active Centrelink Scam**

The scam involves callers claiming to represent Centrelink requesting bank and other personal details. Often, the caller claims to have sent out a letter that hasn't been responded to and then demand that the information must be provided ASAP or risk pensions getting cut off. If questioned, the caller provides an "02" telephone number to call back along with a fake reference number.

Centrelink's number is 132 300 and the reference number is your Customer Reference Number (CRN). If these details don't match, the call should be ignored.
